PREFACE

Teton County's Multi-year training and Exercise Plan (TEP) was developed as a road map to help guide priorities stated in Teton County's After Action Reports (AAR) and Improvement Plans (IP) while following the FEMA core capabilities and Public Health Preparedness capabilities. The creation of this TEP will ensure help to increase our County's preparedness, response, mitigation, and prevention, and recovery capabilities while ensuring there is no overlap in trainings, exercise burn-out, or over scheduling of County resources. Training and exercises allow Teton County to continue to validate and improve our County Plans.

The years covered in this TEP are 2017-2019. Annual meetings and/or surveys will be conducted to continue to shape and build upon this TEP. Teton County Emergency Management and Teton County Public Health will administer this TEP with assistance from other County partners.

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PURPOSE

The purpose of the Multi-year Training and Exercise Plan (TEP) is to document Teton County's overall training and exercise program priorities for a specific multi-year time period. It is considered to be a living document that can be updated and refined annually. These priorities are determined based on the corresponding FEMA core capabilities and Public Health Preparedness core capabilities which coincide with Teton County's strategic guidance, threat assessments, corrective actions from previous exercises, and other factors. This Multi-year TEP identifies the training and exercises that will help the organization build and sustain the core capabilities needed to address its training and exercise program priorities.

The Multi-year TEP should lay out a combination of progressively building exercises – along with the associated training requirements – which address the priorities identified in the Training and Exercise Planning Workshop (TEPW). A progressive, multi-year exercise program enables organizations to participate in a series of increasingly complex exercises, with each successive exercise building upon the previous one until mastery is achieved. Further, by including training requirements in the planning process, organizations can address known shortfalls prior to exercising capabilities.

Included in this Multi-year TEP is a training and exercise schedule, which provides a graphic illustration of the proposed activities scheduled for the years 2017-2019.

PROGRAM PRIORITIES

Teton County's exercise and training priorities were decided by initially reviewing Teton County Threat and Hazard Identification Analysis created by Teton County Emergency Management. Secondly, past After Action Reports for Teton County's most recent Events/Incidents were also reviewed to see what Areas for Improvements and Strengths have been identified for the County. All of the reviewed documents helped to highlight Teton County's priorities for training and exercises. The highest priorities were selected for completion within the fiscal year 2016-2017, while other priorities will be addressed in later fiscal years.

Priority 1: Multi-Agency Coordination with Regard to Complex/Multiple Incident Management

It was noted in multiple After Action Reports that our County needs training in more complex incidents like when Unified Command is used or when there are more than one incidents occurring so there is more than one Incident Commander. Our County continues to push multi-agency participation in exercises so that agencies are familiar with each other before a real-world incident. Multi-agency training and exercises also allows responders to learn about different agencies roles and responsibilities during an incident.

Corresponding Core Capabilities:

- Respond- Operational Communication, Response, Recovery- Infrastructure Systems, Protection- Screening, Search, and Detection

Rationale:

- There are 2 After Action Reports that reference better coordination between agencies with regard to complex events. The first is the Horse thief Fire and the second is the incident on Togwotee Pass. Multi-Agency coordination is a continuous priority that must always be worked on by training and exercising together.
- It is expected that Teton County be able to support a local response for at least 72hours. It has been noted from the Budge Drive Landslide that having a qualified, locally trained Type III team incident management team would allow incidents to run more smoothly.
- As incidents become more complex it would be beneficial to have an EOC support staff that is fully trained in not only complex but multiple location incidents. As noted in a past AAR from Operation Grizzly, having more training in the workings of the EOC and the supporting ICS positions is needed.
- Continued training and exercising of baseline NIMS material allows Teton County to maintain a core level ICS knowledge for all first responders and partner agencies. By understanding the base ICS language, Teton County employees understand how to operate and what is expected throughout an incident.

Supporting Training Courses and Exercises:

- All Hazards Communication Technician, Position-Specific All-Hazard Incident Command System Training, Emergency Operations Center Operations and Planning, G-191, ICS-300, ICS-400, Basic PIO Training, Rendezvous Fest, Eclipse TTX.
- Progressive Exercise Program (PEP) to build to involvement of commercial airlines in annual multi-agency airport exercises.
 - Workshop: Commercial Airlines, JH Airport, and St. John's Medical Center compare information needs and policies to come up with method for passenger information sharing following an incident.
 - Seminar: Conducted by Commercial Airlines on what the responsibilities are of the airlines during an airline accident.
 - Tabletop Exercise: Scenario starts following commercial airliner crash and at least one objective focuses on airline services for victims and families.
 - Full Scale Exercise: Include airline in developing objective to test their personnel in post-crash procedures.

Priority 2: Remain Prepared for Terrorism Threats

During past exercises and trainings it has been noticed that continual training for responders is needed to ensure workers safety. These training and exercises tend to be yearly requirements that are needed to remain certified in specific positions. Besides annual requirements Teton County has identified specific trainings that would increase our function at the local level, for example tactical EMS training. This year Teton County has again identified new capabilities that would increase Teton County's ability to respond to terrorism threats through a local response.

Corresponding Core Capabilities:

- Response- Mass Care, Response- Environmental Response/Health and Safety, Response- Public Health, Healthcare, and Emergency Medical Services, Protection-Screening, Search and Detection

Rationale:

- RERT #8 has specific requirements for bomb techs and other positions. Because of this it is critical to ensure classes like hazmat technician and bomb tech training are funded to make sure that those positions remain certified. In the last RERT call out having the local knowledge to assist in the incident provided essential.
- It has been noted during the Budge Drive Landslide that Teton County need practice in sheltering and feeding larger groups of people. For this event only a handful of people showed up to the shelter. Teton County has yet to see a large scale shelter and an exercise would assist in ensuring that there is local knowledge on a large scale.
- It has been noted in multiple AAR's and seen during the Budge Landslide that having a local Type III IMT Team would be extremely helpful and ensure that we could handle a

response at the local level for 72 hours. By providing this exercise it would allow locals to learn more about specific ICS positions and what the job duties contain.

- It has been noted in AAR's that Teton County does not have a mass care plan and has not had much practice with this capability. Since we are in such a small, isolated location, it would not take many injuries to overwhelm the system. Due to this it is imperative to focus our efforts in improving this core capability in the next few years.

Supporting Training Courses and Exercises:

Hazmat Tech Training, Hazwoper Training, Bomb Tech Training, Shelter Training, Disaster Response Training, K9 training, Active Shooter Full-Scale Exercise, Rendezvous Festival, Decon Trailer Training, MCI/TEMS Exercise, CAMEO, PEAC, and other hazmat modeling software training courses.

METHODOLOGY AND TRACKING

Teton County determined the best way to track training and exercises would be to create a Google calendar. All agency training officers have access to the calendar and will inform the PHRC or EM when a new event should be added. An update to this calendar will occur at every LEPC meeting to ensure County agencies know what events have occurred each month. This calendar is used to track yearly events in Teton County. A yearly TEPW or comprehensive survey will also occur to ensure that Teton County is on track to complete the training and exercise goals set the previous year and to assure that newly recognized areas of improvement are addressed in future training and exercise goals.
